Reynolds Family History

The Avon Baptist Church and Free Masonry A Compilation by Robert N. Reynolds

Credit and praise for the items in this piece belong solely to the meticulous research, perseverance and generosity of Robert C. Mahaney M.D. Years ago when I first heard of Dr. Mahaney's research on the Reynolds Family line, and realized he was a descendant of Asa D.'s son Asa I began following leads whenever or wherever his name was mentioned. I was most intrigued by the story told of him by our mutual cousin Glenn G. Reynolds M.D. Glenn's admiration and respect for Mahaney was clear cut from the beginning, so when he told me that Mahaney had been to Avon searching for the graves of our family in fields and places no longer maintained as cemeteries, my interest really peaked. Recently, the rare opportunity of communicating with Dr. Mahaney lead me to ask him about his efforts to uncover the dust of our forebears in the rich soils of the "Genesee." His response was overwhelming. It led me on a trip of my own -- learning about the history of Livingston County; the artifacts of the Seneca Nation of Indians and the Iroquois that preceded our kin there; the war of 1812; the Wadsworth brothers and their famous offspring who died in the Civil war; the appeal of the Genesee Valley and the special attributes of living for a while at Avon; the hard times of the early 1800s that required not only sweat and tears but the red blood of our ancestors who sacrificed for our better times; and finally the history of the Avon Baptist Church which our family firmly held to for a generation or two -- and then the anti-masonry movement that intruded and forced our forefather Asa D. to take a stand.

This little effort will reveal just a few of the priceless documents and references that Bob Mahaney sent me. What is presented here is just a glimpse of the many digital images that resulted from this inquiry into our family's past. Many more have been captured and placed on disk for any interested party to explore and investigate further. Mixed among the Mahaney treasures are some images captured from Google Earth--a modern miracle that allows us to go and see places we otherwise could only imagine or dream about.

The process at work here has been thus. Dr. Mahaney, supported by his good wife, has searched and researched every meaningful clue. His efforts have taken him out and about--into courthouses, graveyards, libraries, churches, private homes, family history centers, university tombs and halls of knowledge; they have carried him into the far reaches of the Internet too to retrieve valuable and rare documents. The latter is the case in point here. Copies of old rare documents and hard to find written records are here converted into digital images and preserved and displayed for others to see and learn.



Looking northeast from a satellite view of the Livingston County countryside. Look closely and you can see the town of Avon and the location of Lot 195 where Asa D. and Betsy Artlip raised their family from about 1815 until shortly after Asa's death in 1835. Barely legible in the upper part of this photo is the location of the Baptist Church our folks attended during their stay in Avon. History of the Avon Baptist Church:

CHURCHES.—The First Baptist Church of Avon is located at East Avon. In the latter part of 1806, a few of the inhabitants of the then town of Hartford, united themselves in "covenant," forming the Second Baptist Church of Hartford, and called Elder William Firman to be their pastor. In the fall of 1807 they were admitted to the Ontario Association, having a membership of twenty-three. In 1808 the name of the church was changed to the Baptist Church of Avon, on account of the change in the name of the town, and their place of meeting from this time to 1830, was about one mile east of East Avon.

Just when Elder Firman ceased his labors, cannot be ascertained but he was followed by John R. Seaver as early as 1816. He was succeeded by Reuben Winchell in 1823; Rev. David Tenant in 1825; Philander Kelsey in 1827; S. Goodall in 1832; Elder J. G. Stearns, in 1834; Elder E. Stone, in 1838, who remained, however, only six months; Rev. J. W. McDonald, in 1838; Elder A. H. Stowell, in 1841; Elder E. Stone, in 1843; Elder S. M. Bainbridge, March 1, 1844; Elder Wm. Curtis, in 1848; S. F. Campbell, Nov. 9, 1852. From 1852 till May 1856, the church was supplied by students from the Rochester Theological Seminary.

May 31, 1855, E. Nisbet commenced a pastorate that lasted three years. During 1859, Thomas Rodgers supplied the pulpit and was followed in 1860 by H. G. Nott, who left in August, 1864.

Oct. 9, 1864, S. J. Lusk, accepted a call and was ordained in March, 1865, but remained only one year. Rev. B. F. Mace began Feb. 4, 1866, but remained only eight months. The pulpit since then has been supplied with students from the Rochester Theological Seminary. One hundred and seventeen persons have been baptized within the last thirty years.

July 18, 1827, the name was again changed to the First Baptist Church of Avon. In 1828 arrangements were made to build a new church at East Avon. The church was not dedicated till 1830. In 1832 the Livingston County Baptist Association was formed and held their first meetings in this church."

There is no "Avon Baptist Church" today. The task then of learning about it when it existed in the early 1800s is one of digging into old archives when and if they can be found, Fortunately for us today the Selden family had the foresight to preserve the early church records and keep them for posterity by donating them to the Rare Manuscript Collections, Carl A. Kroch Library at Cornell University. Dr. Mahaney had the persistence and "know how" to retrieve them.



The greater part of the collection is concerned with activities of Baptist churches in Livingston County, New York, and includes pamphlets of the annual meetings of the Livingston Baptist Association (1844-1918); manuscript volumes relating to the First Baptist Church of East Avon, New York; also, accounts, notes of church meetings, lists of members, articles of faith, and financial papers; also, historical pamphlets on Rush, N.Y. and the Genesee Valley Canal written by Mary M. At a church meeting at the Meetinghouse held March 20th 1824 Opened the meeting by prayer.

1. The committee appointed to visit Sister Lorana Reynolds reported her excuse for neglecting the church but got no satisfaction.

2. She praying for further --- from the church her case was postponed until a future church meeting.

Pastor Philander Kelsey served from 1827 until 1832. He preached the service for Jeremiah when he died in September 1827. The Reynolds with no first name showing is probably Jeremiah as Asa D. is on the first list and these names appear to be heads of households and their wives. Note Levi, husband of Lorana is on the list in February 1827. See next List.

Note Elizabeth Reynolds would be wife of Jeremiah and the Mrs. Kennicott would be her daughter Elizabeth, wife of John Kennicott who died 6 March 1826. Mrs. A. D. Reynolds would be Betsy Artlip Reynolds.

- * Brother Levi Reynolds is still at Avon in March 1831; and the church is having issues with him i.e., "he will attend meeting or render an excuse."
- * Church votes to send a couple of deacons to have a little confab with A. D. Reynolds, again!

Significant Developments:

* Brother A. D. Reynolds is now considered to be a "case." And it is put off "untill next Saturday."

- * Pastor Kelsey's proposal, whatever it is, is not accepted. We know he is no longer the Pastor.
- * Saturday, September 6, 1834: "Met according to appointment. Bro. Reynolds present. Heard him on the subject of masonry, said he could not renounce it. Therefore, Voted that we withdraw the hand of fellowship from him."

To appreciate the decision that Asa D. Reynolds made in holding to his beliefs in freemasonry versus a continued fellowship in his Baptist Church membership can only be had by studying and learning about the socio-political realities that had a bearing on people's lives in the Genesee Valley in the early 1830s. It is somewhat complex but the subject is treated in detail in "A History of Livingston County" by Lockwood L. Doty, 1876. This work can be downloaded free on the Internet by looking it up in Google Books. Doty takes the reader through a brief history of the anti-masonry movement that began in 1826 in western New York and literally changed the face of local politics and peoples attitudes one to another by the time the decision was forced on Asa D. The politics of the anti-masonry movement in Livingston County also invaded the Baptist Church there as we saw in the foregoing example of Asa D.

To what extent Asa D.'s decision had on his family will probably never be known. For sure it had an impact on his children because it most certainly would have carried into the privacy of his home life where intense emotions are usually expressed. Asa D. died just seven months after he was dis-fellow-shipped from his Baptist congregation. His two oldest sons, Levi H. and Asa continued his Masonic tradition and were honored by the order at their funerals.

An additional list of Avon Baptist Church members was provided by Mahaney which shows the valuation of their land holdings. None of the Reynolds family was on the list which, perhaps can be interpreted to imply that none of the family owned land. A search of the deed records for the Reynolds Lot 195 might shed some light on that subject.
